THE FRIENDS

The Friends of Thomas Plume's Library was founded in 1988 in order to help the Plume Trustees to preserve their collection in a good state for future generations. The Friends became a registered charity in 2003.

The Friends help the Trust in its educative function with the History prize for year 8 students of the Plume School. This is an award for the best essay submitted following their visit to the Plume Library. The Friends also raise funds for the repair and renovation of the books and pamphlets, and help to purchase replacements for the 16th and 17th century books that have been lost.

The committee of the Friends arrange four events annually; the AGM, which includes a talk, a visit to an outstanding library, an open day in the Plume Library itself, and a social evening.

THE LIBRARY

Dr Thomas Plume was born in Maldon in 1630 and died near Rochester in 1704. From 1658 he was vicar of Greenwich and from 1679 he was archdeacon of Rochester. He left considerable sums for charitable purposes, including the creation of a chair of astronomy at Cambridge University, but he maintained close links with his native Maldon.

In 1698-9 Dr Plume funded the erection of a two-storey building on the site of the partly collapsed St Peter's church; the ground floor for the Grammar School and the first floor to house the considerable collection of books which he bequeathed to Maldon on his death.

His library remains in its handsome panelled room, approached by the ancient spiral staircase in the church tower. It provides the perfect setting for the collection of some 8,200 books and pamphlets and in excess of another 2000 which have been since 1704.

The Library is open to visitors on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays between 2pm and 4pm and on Saturday mornings from 10am to 12 noon.
